Annual Meeting of Parishioners (In Person)  
January 26, 2025**

The Annual Meeting of Parishioners of Holy Cross Anglican Church was held on January 26, 2025, in person in the church, commencing at 12:30 pm with quorum attained – 37 people.

Motions approved in this meeting:

- Approval of the Minutes of the 2024 AMP
- Receipt and approval of all reports, with exception of the Financial Statements
- Receipt and approval of the 2024 Financial Report as presented
- Approval of the 2025 Deficit Budget as presented
- Parish permits the new Corporation to seek an auditor for an external review

**1. Opening Prayer: The Rev. Simba Mutandwa**

Rev. Simba opened this meeting with prayer.

**2. Call to Order:**

The meeting was called to order at 12:33 pm by Rev. Simba.

**1) Appointment of Meeting Secretary**

The Rev. Deacon Carol Tubman was appointed as secretary for this meeting.

**3. 1) Minutes from the 2024 Annual Meeting of Parishioners on January 28, 2024**

**1) Receiving of Reports as circulated:**

The Financial Report was presented separately. We received 34 reports, highlighting Administration, Nurture & Education, Outreach and Worship. Many of these committees continue to seek volunteers.

All the Reports (except the Financial Report) were received as presented

**2) Discussion:** None

**3) 2023 Financial Report: Ken Lipsett, Treasurer**

**Page 19: Balance Sheet:** This shows what we own and what we owe.

In 2024, excess cash went into a Savings account. During the year, we earned interest of approximately \$3,000. McMahon Loan: During the year, \$2,000 was paid against the loan. This payment was made with Parish Council approval from half the proceeds from the Candy Cane Bazaar. There is still approximately \$51,000 to be repaid, as an "on demand" loan.

Our long-term investment of approximately \$10,000 (Living Life Fund) is locked in until March 2027..

**Page 20: Income Statement:** This shows our operations. We almost broke even.

Pledged Offerings were lower than anticipated by about \$23,000. This was offset by other offerings such as Easter/Christmas and other specific parishioner donations.

Building costs came in under budget..

We were able to repair a portion of the roof with a grant from the Diocese, but there were extra expenditures (approximately \$8,300) for this repair.

Ken offered thanks for parishioner generosity and stewardship.

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**4) Consideration and Adoption of 2025 Deficit Budget:**

In 2024, we passed a Deficit Budget of \$24,000. It is difficult to budget expected costs and bequests. This year, the parish is being asked to pass a larger deficit budget of \$34,000 with the hope that donations will come.

**Designated Funds** that are subject to provisions of a "trust document," but are ultimately the responsibility of the Corporation:

- **Florence Waterman Brown Trust:** for specific Sunday School expenditures
- **Rector's Discretionary Fund:** Expenditures at the discretion of the Incumbent
- **Living Life Fund:** This donation from a former parishioner is to be invested; when the fund has doubled, the parish can use the funds that are over and above the original \$10,000.

**Treasurer & Envelope Secretary announcement:** the Government has proposed to extend the 2024 donation deadline to the end of February 2025. Contributions in January and February can be used for 2024 tax deductions. This is not yet law – it is in limbo due to the prorogation of parliament. Ken and Linda will be watching this situation.

**Rev. Simba** offered a vote of thanks to Ken for a job well done.

Ken thanks this parish for their cooperation and generosity. He particularly thanked all the Corporations he has worked with over the past years, Rev. Simba and previous Incumbents, council members and the administration assistants Sandi and Gloria.

**5) Treasurer Announcement:**

Ken is retiring; he will be available to offer advice going forward.

Our new Treasurer is Barrie Griffiths. Barrie thanked Ken for his service.

**6) Appointment of an Auditor:**

**Shane Noble** has been doing a review of our books for several years. Ken wishes to have an external review, as this is a time of transition from one treasurer to another, to ensure that the books are in a reasonable state. An auditor will be engaged by the Corporation.

**Motion:** That the parishioners attending this AMP give permission to our new Corporation to seek an auditor for an external review.

**7. Other Business**

**1) Financial Concerns: David Hansen**

On behalf of Corporation, David addressed the issue of our church building aging. There are things in the new part of the building that are wearing out. Herb Poile made an extensive review of issues that will need to be looked into: Window replacement on the lower east side of the building and the upper hall; exterior siding; paint on the handrails; vent covers; and electrical issues. A serious and expensive issue is the condition of our six furnaces which are in various stages of inefficiency. David suggests that the parish hire an engineering firm to review and propose solutions for replacement or modification of the furnace system. This is an unbudgeted item, which will need to be dealt with either this year or in 2026. A future parish meeting will be called to update how we will go forward. A ballpark figure - \$150,000 may be a low number. It was suggested that we may be able to receive a grant from the City for improving efficiency.

## ADMINISTRATION

### **The Incumbent's Report to The Holy Cross Annual People's Meeting (AMP), 25<sup>TH</sup> of January 2026.**

My dearest friends in Christ, Grace to you and Peace from God our Father, Amen!

In the words of St Paul to the Corinthian church in 1 Corinthians 1:4, *"I give thanks to God always for you because of the grace of God which was given you in Christ Jesus, that in every way you were enriched with all speech and all knowledge, even as the testimony to Christ was confirmed among you, so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift, as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ; who will sustain you to the end, guiltless in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ."*

#### **General overview.**

The year 2025 was overall a good year in all aspects of our lives. However, I cannot rule out the fact that we faced challenges as a Diocese, Parish, families, and individuals. But thanks, be God for His protective help throughout the year. I would like to take this opportunity to speak to those who no longer believe, no longer hope, no longer pray, because they think God has left or deserted His church. I, too, was at one point angry with God when my Father passed away; I saw good people die, children suffering, people going hungry, and others suffering from all kinds of addiction. And yes, there were days when I prayed and only felt an echo. But then I discovered something; God does not shout, God whispers. And sometimes he whispers from the places we least expect to find him. I am therefore inviting you, my brothers and Sisters in Christ, during this year 2026 to take time to be silent and get to hear what God is saying to you in that special "whisper".

#### **Worship.**

I continue to thank God for everyone who responded to His call to come and worship here at Holy Cross during the year 2025. Our doors were always open, and the Clergy were available to lead God's people in prayer and worship. The Wednesday morning Eucharist service has seen a fair growth in attendance averaging **11** people every week, we have coffee and fellowship after service in the St Cyprian room. **The Rev Deacon Carol Tubman** conducts Evening Prayer every Wednesday and the attendance is also growing. I am glad to announce that we had several "**walk-ins**" in most of our services. These were people passing by the road who suddenly feel the urge to pray, and we welcomed them with open hands. Our Sunday services have also seen the 8:30am service averaging **12** people and the 10am service averaging about **50** people. I thank God for the new members who joined us in 2025, and I pray that more people will consider joining us and making Holy Cross their home.

#### **Outreach and Ministry beyond the Parish.**

As a Parish, we had a successful outreach program to the **Calgary Drop-in Center**. A team of dedicated people met on **the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>** Thursday of every month to make an average of about **200** sandwiches and coffee which we took and gave to the hungry and homeless in downtown Calgary. Special thanks go to Mathew Embry for this initiative; with God's grace, we hope to continue with this ministry. In addition to the worship services here at Holy Cross, the worship assistants take communion to the sick and conduct services at Retirement and seniors' homes, specifically **Boardwalk and Statesman Senior's residence**. Special thanks go to **Cheryl Hansen, Anne Davidson, and Clare Malcom**.

I continue to appeal for volunteers to join the various ministries in the Parish.

### CORPORATION REPORT 2025

The Corporation saw changes at the beginning of 2025 with the appointment of David Hansen as Incumbent's Warden and Shayne Dickin as Assistant Incumbent's Warden by Fr. Simba. We also had the election of Kathy McNair as People's Warden and David Peyto as Assistant People's Warden.

The focus for the Corporation in 2025 has been the increase of our membership as well as increase of revenue.

We have seen a moderate increase in membership resulting in greater attendance at the Sunday 8:30 am (changed from 8:00) and the 10:00 am services, as well as the Wednesday 9:30 am and 6:30 pm services. We launched an advertising campaign in November with the placement of a half-page colour advertisement in several community newsletters, with the help of a grant from the Diocese. Also, our webpage is being kept up to date with what's going on at Holy Cross.

Our rentals increased in 2025 with the addition of:

Rooted In Grace, a Christian Home School group who meet in several rooms on 3 Tuesdays per month  
Monday Night support Group, who meet weekly  
Co-Dependent Group, who meet 2 Saturday mornings per month  
Luminous Voices, who hold occasional board meetings as well as rent storage space in the basement  
Calgary Artist Society, who will be hosting art shows twice a year in April and October  
David Peyto, who rents storage space for his books in the basement

As stated at our last AMP and in the stewardship letters that went out in November, we have 6 aging furnaces in the older part of the church that need to be replaced. We started a fund-raising campaign in November with the initial goal of \$30,000 to replace the two oldest furnaces. We do not have an exact cost for the replacement of all 6 furnaces currently, as we require funds to begin the consultation and bidding process. But our conservative guesstimate at this point would be \$100,000 - \$125,000. We will continue to hold various types of fund-raisers during 2026 and beyond as well as seeking out sources of funding and grants.

Thank You to Wayne Kelly who has continued to perform small maintenance jobs. Thank You to John Uncles for the removal of the small pew at the front of the church and its placement in the Narthex.

The Corporation wishes to Thank Barrie Griffiths and the wonderful team of volunteers who have created a beautiful garden right in the heart of our property, providing a place of refreshment and contemplation for those who garden and garden visitors. We thank Barrie for his vision and generous gifts of time and talent to bring this space to life, enriching us all, and sadly he is unable to continue in this leadership role.

The Corporation wishes to report that Barrie Griffiths, Ministry of Lectors volunteer, is no longer able to continue in this leadership role. Barrie has provided guidance, training, and logistical support for the individuals eager to speak the words of scripture during our liturgy and for this we are extremely grateful.

The Theological Trust Fund has been capably managed by Barrie Griffiths, in collaboration with the Bishop, for many years. Barrie is no longer able to continue volunteering in this important role. On behalf of the parish, the Corporation would like to thank Barrie for his consistent efforts to identify suitable recipients to receive funding for training.

We prayerfully await the Lord's guidance for us in 2026.

## NURTURE & EDUCATION

### EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY—EfM

Education for Ministry is a lay-oriented international theological education program that has been hosted by Holy Cross every week since 2021, and continues here every Thursday afternoon. Currently Holy Cross is parish home to many graduates of the program, and we have one student currently in the last year of the program. The group includes members of several other parishes, and we are serving the Diocese in hosting this group.

The EfM program is constantly adapting to keep up to date, to meet the practical and intellectual needs of lay church members, and to offer various pathways to complete the program. Anyone who might like to enrol can contact Rev. Deacon Carol, to follow links in the weekly Diocesan Newsletter, or to speak to any graduate of the program at Holy Cross. Anyone who graduated a while ago might be interested to know that a lot has been added and changed, and enrolment has been made much more flexible.

### CURSILLO

Cursillo (pronounced kur-SEE-yo) is a Spanish word meaning “short course.” The full title is Cursillo de Christiandad, meaning “a short course in Christian living.” Cursillo is intended to bring forth Christian leaders. It presents a method of Christian living and demonstrates how to structure our lives so as to make a difference in the world. Although the movement is run by the Diocese under the authority of the Bishop, all baptised Christians are welcome to participate.

The Cursillo method has three major components: the Weekend (a three-day event at the Entheos Conference and Retreat Centre), Group Reunion (regular small group meetings) and Ultreyas (monthly gatherings of the Cursillo community).

In 2025, one Holy Cross parishioner attended a weekend for the first time. Other parishioners took part on the teams for the weekends.

Several parishioners are actively participating in group reunions.

In 2026, there will be a single three-day weekend in the spring for men and women (co-ed), and two separate men's and women's three-day weekends in the fall.

### SCOUTS CANADA 31<sup>ST</sup> ST CYPRIAN'S SCOUTING GROUP 2025 Annual Report for the Holy Cross Anglican Parish

The 31<sup>st</sup> has had another robust year in supporting Scouts Canada's mission to help develop well rounded youth, better prepared for success in the world.

The 2025 year started off with our Friendship Tour to Sydney Australia. Since 1979 the 31<sup>st</sup> and the 2<sup>nd</sup> Templecombe in England have been travelling or hosting each other on international excursions. In 2001 we were joined by the 1<sup>st</sup> Engadine Group in Australia and it was their turn to host us. The groups arrived in Sydney just in time to enjoy their world famous New Year's Eve fireworks. That kicked off an exciting trip of hikes along the rugged coast and in the Blue Mountains. Staying in a challenging but rewarding camp in the Australian bush. Clambering over the Sydney Harbour Bridge, touring the Sydney Opera House and botanical gardens. Enjoying a couple of beach days and generally taking in Australian culture. Trips like these are core to building international understanding and friendships and we are very proud to be able to support youth in these adventures.

At home our youth put the Out in ScOuts going on several weekend camps. The Scouts and Venturers hiked 12 km into the stunningly beautiful Lake O'Hara on a chilly Friday night in late October. Staying in the historic Alpine Club of Canada's Elizabeth Parker Hut we safely explored the snowy valley. This camp is often a formative backpacking experience for the youth leading to even greater excursions.

The Cubs held fall and winter camps at Jubilee Camp in Cochrane, participated in the All Sections Camp at Lost Lake near Water Valley in May, went hiking at Nose Hill and learned about Bow River fish habitats at the Patrick Burns Fish Hatchery.

Our Beavers have been their usual energetic selves well supported by a large group of scouters. Scout Hall sleep overs, indoor snowball toss, learning elements of first aid, knot tying, navigation and of course beaver buggies all make for busy happy beavers. They also came out for the day to our Lost Lake All Sections Camp.

Our small but active satellite group in Brownsfield Alberta also had a great year. The highlight was the cubs and scouts building and paddling kayaks! An amazing adventure for these youth.

By the numbers, our group remains very strong with 39 Beavers, 37 Cubs, 32 Scouts, 16 Venturers and 4 Rovers. The Group is supported by over 40 volunteers.

Our fundraising continues to be solid with bottle drives, our Stampede Parade Seats and our most important fundraiser; the annual Christmas Tree sale at the Holy Cross Church. Without the Church's support for this fundraiser the 31<sup>st</sup> would not be able to support the excellent programming we provide or operate the wonderful Scout Hall we lease from the City. We are also grateful for the Church allowing us space for our annual Baden Powell dinner and for the last couple of years – our Christmas Market.

Speaking of the Hall, we are in final negotiations with the City to get a long term lease signed after our renovation 1.5 years ago. While some warranty issues with the renovation continue to create challenges we are enjoying the enhanced indoor and outdoor spaces.

Once again we are very grateful for the sponsorship of the Holy Cross Anglican Parish and look forward to greater collaboration on projects that will foster volunteerism in our youth and families.

### VIDEOGRAPHY MINISTRY REPORT

In 2025, Holy Cross streamed 54 worship services. These were the regular 10 AM Sunday services, plus special ones for Holy Week, Christmas Day, etc. We also streamed three funerals. The statistics for our YouTube live streams are:

The average number of viewers per service (34.1) varies considerably ( $\sigma^2=16.3$ ). Also, that number is much larger than the number of viewers who watch live, which is typically in the single digits.

Sound continues to be an issue. Two microphones were purchased in 2024, in hopes of improving the sound of the choir, and overall ambient sound. However, I do not have the technical and handyman skills to mount the microphones, or run the cables from them to the sound console. I still need help from handy people to get these installed, tested, and working.

The number of team members has increased thanks to student volunteers who help out. This has made a huge difference. We are very grateful to these young people, and parishioner volunteers, for their assistance.
